<b>Introductory Course</b>	<b>O119/120</b>	<b>Leaders of the PACC</b>	The Leaders of the PACC course is designed to promote and cultivate leadership skills that will serve the student invaluable in achieving his or her future academic and career goals. The course will be offered to any incoming freshmen that are willing and able to commit to a rigorous academic curriculum that will develop their abilities to be current leaders on campus as well as future leaders in their communities.	
<b>Concentrator</b>	<b>C851/852</b>	<b>Law and Justice 1</b>	This course allows students to survey the range of legal careers including paralegals, attorneys, social justice advocates, mediators, and other occupations. The course provides students with a basis for understanding the American political and legal systems, with a focus on legal ideas and the legal process, how the law works and the sources of US law. <b>Capstone Course I</b>	<b>C853/854</b>	<b>Law and Justice 2</b>	Three three sectors of careers network together under the authority of local, state and national policy to deliver the products and services needed for society to thrive. This course will examine these three sectors: Public, Nonprofit and Private. Each sector will be studied in the context of the surrounding city, student career choice, policy, law and history. Each student will complete a project for each sector that addresses students' findings about a specific career field, department or organization in that sector. <b>Capstone Course II</b>	<b>C855/856</b>	<b>Law and Justice 3</b>	This capstone course allows students to examine how statutes and policies are developed to safeguard society throughout history and the relationship to today's legal and political practices. Students will understand the analysis of civil rights and liberties, and the ways courts and legislators deal with constitutional questions. Students will develop the skills and knowledge relevant to the needs of modern legal practice, legal analysis, entry into legal practice and public policy careers, necessary pathways and preparation into postsecondary advancement and future job prospects and progression to higher level careers in Legal Practices.
